Alligators Among Us

With over 100 ponds in Meadow Pointe II and lots of conservation areas, most of us have seen the occasional alligator in our community. Recently a few of our residents have been nervous about their presence and are unclear on what can or should be done about alligators.

The American Alligator was once hunted nearly to extinction. Conservation efforts and regulation helped save the species, and they were removed from the endangered species list in 1987. However, there are still numerous regulations in place to protect alligators.

Basically, we share this area with alligators, as well as quite a bit of other wildlife. If any of us see an alligator, just appreciate it. Millions of people never get to see an alligator in its natural habitat. However, DO NOT approach it, feed it, or harm it in any way.

Alligators, despite being considered an apex predator. do not naturally attack people. They don't associate people with food, and they don't consider humans to be potential food. However. alligators can learn, and quickly. If an alligator is fed, that alligator will associate people with food. It will then be far more likely to approach people, potentially attacking them - especially smaller people, like children. Florida Statute 372.667 even makes it a misdemeanor criminal offense to feed alligators. On a related note, it's also illegal to feed black bears, raccoons, foxes, or sand hill cranes.

Many of our residents are apprehensive about the proximity of the alligators, especially if they are from further north, or have pets or small children at the home. However, it's highly unlikely that an alligator would ever pose a threat. If an alligator does appear to be a threat, there is action that can be

taken. To be considered a threat, an alligator has to be at least 4' long, and exhibit behavior that threatens people or pets. This would be an attack or charge at a person or pet, or encroaching significantly onto homeowner's property. If this occurs, the resident should contact the Alligator Hotline at 1-866-392-4286. This is a toll free line set up by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. They will come and capture the alligator. However, FWCC will NOT relocate the alligator, they will put it down. So we ask all residents to only contact the hotline if the animal is a threat.

Hopefully having everyone on the same page and armed with some knowledge will avoid fear and confusion. As long as we are smart and never feed them, we should be able to peaceably coexist with alligators and still have a beautiful and safe community.

Parking


Parking often comes up as an issue. Throughout MPII there is no parking permitted on the streets. This is a Pasco County ordinance, and has nothing to do with MPII. Also, residents are not permitted to block sidewalks with their vehicles. This is a critical safety issue. The sidewalks need to remain clear for pedestrians - especially, but not limited to - seniors, physically disabled, and children. When vehicles block the sidewalks, pedestrians are forced to walk into the street, often having to walk on grass and/or negotiate curbs. For many of our residents, this is very

dangerous. So please, if you need to get an extra vehicle into your driveway, park on the apron (parallel to the street, across the driveway, not blocking the sidewalk—see the diagram below).

MPII does have, and enforces, parking regulations against parking on tree lawns (grass area between streets and sidewalks) as well as CDD property (in non HOA villages). Some HOAs also have strict enforcement policies regarding parking. MPII (CDD only) villages include: Colehaven, Glenham, Iverson, Manor Isle, and Wrencrest.

HOA villages are: Charlesworth, Covina Key, Lettingwell, Longleaf, Sedgwick, Tullamore, and Vermillion.

If you need additional parking for an event, Pasco County will sell you a parking permit – and this can be done at our Clubhouse, you don't have to go to a county office. Pasco allows residents to purchase one permit per calendar year, and each permit can work for 4 days in that calendar year. With these restrictions, some forethought and preparation are highly recommended. More information is available from our friendly office staff.



Guest Passes

Due to a few incidents at the basketball courts, MPII has opted to adhere very strictly to our guest pass policy going forward. Since many of our residents may be unfamiliar or unclear about our guest pass policy, we thought we should clarify it so everyone is on the same page.

Residents that have current MPII ID cards of course have access to our amenities. MP I, III, or IV residents that have purchased valid MPII ID cards have access to all but the Fitness Center. MPI, III, and IV residents are not permitted to bring

guests or obtain guest passes. Minor children, of course, are allowed to accompany them to the pool or playground. MPII residents can not use MPI facilities.

For MPII residents who wish to have a guest come to our facilities, the "MPII member" has to come to the office to request and obtain the guest pass. A "MPII member" is defined as the owner(s) identified on the deed or mortgage, or in the case of renters - the resident(s) identified on the lease. Residents with valid ID cards that are ages 15-17 are not eligible to obtain guest passes. They must have the

parent that qualifies as the "MPII member" come and obtain one for their guest. Each MPII member may obtain up to five guest passes.

In addition to the enforcement of the above guest pass policy, MPII staff members will be conducting periodic ID checks. All residents and guests must have their ID card or guest pass on their person while using the facilities.

We want our residents and their guests to safely and comfortably enjoy the use of all the great MPII amenities.

With the New Year underway we have several projects going on. Our maintenance staff is taking advantage of the milder weather to work on another series of ponds. This is an ongoing project where our staff restores eroding shorelines of ponds. MPII has well over 100 ponds, and some of those ponds are starting to show a little age. So based on recommendations from our engineer, we put them into a priority order and we do as many as we can each season. We take advantage of the cooler weather to do it as it is very labor intensive. We also spread them out

each year to ease the burden on the budget.

In addition to the ponds, we are working on CDD owned sidewalks again. Some of the preliminary work is done by our staff, but we contract with a third party to remove old sidewalk sections and lay new ones. Please note, if a sidewalk near your property is being worked on, you will need to turn your sprinklers off for THREE full days once the new section is laid so it will set correctly.
